





The letter Π looks similar to the Greek letter Π which we use in math for the famous number 3.14. No wonder it makes the sound [p] as in pup or purple.

The Russian word for dad is nana. Do you see a small tilted dash above the first letter a in nána? It's a stress mark. It shows which syllable in the word is emphasized. In Russian, the vowel sound in the stressed syllable is pronounced clearly, while the unstressed vowels, on opposite, are pronounced briefly, as if their sounds were reduced. Listen to these words: nána, máma. Notice that the first syllable in both words is stressed, that's why the first letter a can be heard clearly while the vowel in the second syllable doesn't even sound as [a] anymore, it sounds more like a very short unstressed a in about.

The letter \mathbf{A} makes the sound similar to [d] in dad or domestic. It's pronounced a bit dryer than the English [d]: the tip of your tongue should touch the back of your upper front teeth. \mathbf{Aom} is home or house in Russian. Listen and translate: $\mathbf{To} - \mathbf{Aom}$? \mathbf{Aa} , $\mathbf{To} - \mathbf{Aom}$.
