

**Это – фото.** This is a photo. **Это – холм.** This is a hill.

**Это** – флаг. This is a flag. **Это – рак.** This is a crawfish.

Here are three more Russian letters which are similar to Greek letters. The letter  $\Phi$   $\phi$  looks like the Greek letter *phi*. Think of it as your fantastic funny friend. It's fun to write, too!

Watch out for the letter  $\mathbf{X} \times \mathbf{x} - it$ 's a trickster! It looks like the English letter  $X \times \mathbf{x}$  but don't be tricked by its appearance. It actually makes the sound similar to [h] in hare but much stronger and closer to [k] in kite. Another good example of this sound would be ch in Bach. (Do you like classical music?) So, how should you pronounce this sound? Trick yourself: prepare to say the sound [k], notice the position of your vocal cords. From this position, try to say [h] instead – you will get a perfect Russian  $\mathbf{x}$  coming from your throat. **Хорошо!** 

The letter  $\mathbf{P}$   $\mathbf{p}$  is another trickster. It doesn't sound like [p] in pup! (Remember the word  $\mathbf{nana}$ ?) The letter  $\mathbf{P}$   $\mathbf{p}$  makes a flap or trilled [r] sound similar to a Spanish or Scottish [r]. The position for  $\mathbf{P}$  is similar to the position of your tongue when you say [tt] in "I need a better butter for a better batter."
